As I traveled alone, I began my journey to France on March 10, 2017 to Chatillon always trusting in God. I landed




in Paris on March 11, 2017, on my way to Lyon, France. Following the instructions I received, I looked for the lady with the yellow umbrella and "400" sign at the airport. I do not think if I truly thought deeply about it I would not have traveled from the comfort of my home to navigate international traveling. God truly was with me because I followed the instructions and ended up on a bus from Lyon with members of the US delegation to the birth place of the Ladies of Charity. We were happy to see one another and bonded together through conversations about our journey. At this point I still had no idea where I would be staying. I knew that Winona Nelson, a Lady of Charity from Montgomery Alabama, would be staying in the home with me. We separated into groups of two staying with six different families. As a greeting, my hostess who spoke no English made fresh bread and had a bottle of wine for us. My knowledge of French

was limited to the French I learned in junior high. In high school and college, I studied Spanish instead of French. Between my limited French and Winona's knowledge of French we were able to communicate. I also remember what Sister Poole our retreat moderator said about the love of God. The love of God can be shown through a smile and simply saying "Merci". Our hostess and I hugged and smiled a lot. This experience taught me about kindness and what we had learned at our last National Assembly about a "Vincentian Heart".

The people of Chatillon provided a simple meal for us each day. The children entertained us one night. Many people shared their gifts and talents with us during my visit. My experience showed me the importance of reflecting on our mission of seeing the big picture and realizing what Vincent envisioned about serving others around the world. I met people from the fifty-some countries represented at the gathering. Vincent and Louise who became saints had private struggles but understood the big picture. The growth of a small group of women is possible.

Why Are We Celebrating the 400 Anniversary?

This statement was uttered recently at a Ladies of Charity Meeting, after having attended the International Association of Charities and meeting with other members of the Vincentian Family I realize we must do more to educate our members.

It is a big deal because from a small group of women in Chatillon a world-wide organization of Catholic men and women were started. The Ladies of Charity was just the beginning when St Vincent saw the need to serve the poor, elderly, sick and to care for the abandon children.

This was something new, organizing and working together as a group to address these issues. Organizing and working with others take certain skills. St Vincent realized that when years after he started the Ladies of Charity he asked St Louise de Marillac in 1629 to help him coordinate the groups and visit them. He them started the Daughters of Charity in 1633 to complement each other in their vocation.

From these humble beginnings, the organization started in 1617 has spread to over 53 countries in the world. As Ladies of Charity we are rooted in following the Gospel and St Vincentian principles of Simplicity, Humility and Charity.

We are celebrating the 400 Anniversary of the starting of the Ladies of Charity and the Vincentian Family because from that seed grew hospitals, such as Providence Hospital, schools, such as Elizabeth Ann Seton High School in Bladensburg, homes for abandoned children, such as St Ann's and the demand for demanding care and showing the love of Jesus Christ to others.

- Discuss the ADW's organization/structure and how it relates to the above entities.
- Identify how understanding the AIC can result in what we each can do to:
 - Commit to the Vincentian organization's values;
 - Reach out to others in doing our mission and in growing associations; and
 - Help strengthen our leadership infrastructure.

A continental breakfast and tasty box lunch will be served. More information will be sent later this summer.

Calvert County St. Anthony's Ladies of Charity

In April, St. Anthony's held a Dental Clinic sponsored by Catholic Charities via Health Partners, a non-profit primary healthcare organization, founded by Sisters of the Holy Cross.

Health Partners, located in Waldorf MD, provided a dentist, two assistants and one hygienist. This clinic provided x-rays, fillings, extractions, cleanings and treatment plans to sixteen clients.

Also in April, St. Anthony's inducted five new Ladies of Charity.

Easter Holiday Meals - a total of 196 meals were distributed which represented approximately 700 household members.

The Saint Matthias unit of the Ladies of Charity ended their year with a Day of Recollection. The Day of Recollection was a means-of-givingthanks to the Lord for providing the unit with numerous resources to give aid to those in need, and to give honor to our patron, Saint Louise de Marillac. The theme of the day was "Giving to the less fortunate". The day began with Mass celebrated by our spiritual advisor Fr. Milton Jordan; followed by a service which included: prayers to Saint Louise de Marillac, the rosary, and readings from the Old and New Testaments. Deacon Alton Davis delivered the sermon/reflection which highlighted the various acts of giving. He reminded us that we each have been given special talents to be used to help someone and that we must not squander away those talents.

Over the years, our enrollment has increased to twenty-four (24), and we're still recruiting. We're anxious to recruit younger members since ninety (90%) percent of our membership are retirees. Thus far, our activities have not been totally hindered because of age. Our primary activity is the food bank. A bag of non-perishable food is distributed weekly to residents within an eight (8) mile area of the church. At Thanksgiving and Christmas, a holiday basket (ham/turkey) is provided to families in need. We are currently exploring other activities of lending a hand to the shut-ins of the parish and providing assistance to our parish school children.

Marian Spirituality A Distinctive Characteristic of Vincentian Charism Lucy Ann Saunders, Past LCUSA President (training as *VSM)

Marian spirituality has a deep tradition within the church from the earliest time. Ladies of Charity are called to find in Mary inspiration and an example of what it means be a disciple of Christ. Vincent, Louise and Elizabeth Ann all were nourished in their spirituality with a special devotion to Mary.

St. Louise had many little devotional practices to honor Mary. She wrote a prayer of offering to the Virgin placing her son and herself under Mary's protection after her husband's death. She lists several practices in her Rule of Life to honor Mary; Hail Mary and the rosary. She went on pilgrimage to Chartres where she consecrated the Daughters of Charity to Mary. She referred to Mary as the only Mother of the first Daughters of Charity. In the last words of her Spiritual Testament, St. Louise stressed to her sisters, "Pray earnestly to the Blessed Virgin, that she may be your only Mother."

"Charitable women informed Vincent de Paul about persons in need in 1617.... As a result, he established the first Confraternity of Charity (Ladies of Charity) at Chatillon-les-Dombes. The foundation was the genesis of the Vincentian family. The confraternity was the first institutional expression of the Vincentian charism with its distinctive Marian character. In their foundational document, Vincent implores the ladies to take the Mother of God 'for patroness and protector of the work". (AMM Spring Bulletin 2017, Betty Ann McNeil, DC).

This Marian character was reflected by Vincent as he was known to focus on:


- 1. The Immaculate Conception: Mary was born without sin and emptied herself to welcome God: Vincent desired his followers to welcome God, to be filed with God; to clothe oneself with Christ who emptied Himself as did Mary.
- 2. The Annunciation: Mary knew her smallness before God and gave herself to God to serve others in order to accomplish God's work.
- 3. The Visitation: Vincent suggested to his followers that Mary's promptness in her Visitation to her cousin, Elizabeth, was a model of service to those living in poverty.

Ladies of Charity are called by Baptism and called again in our organization to be attentive and available to follow the Will of God in all times, to allow Christ to take form in us and to proclaim the gospel of love for those living in poverty in tangible ways. How do you see Mary as a part of your life when serving others? Had you thought of Mary as being the patroness and protector of our Ladies of Charity work?

The Ladies of Charity USA also focused on this Marian Spirituality when they announced their 400th Anniversary. The picture of the Annunciation on LCUSA's anniversary card captures a beautiful scene of a young Mary painted by Henry Ossawa Tanner in 1898 and found in the Philadelphia Museum of Art. A beautiful picture that serves as a reflection on how we as Ladies of Charity respond to God's call to serve. Yes Ladies, we are filled with the Marian Spirituality and the charism of St. Vincent de Paul -gifts that keep on giving and strengthening us as we serve in our ministries.
