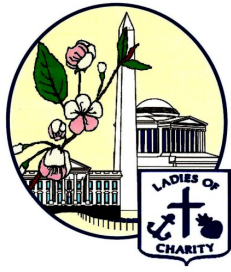

Our Lenten project this year was to collect and provide clothing, shoes, hand bags, home essentials, etc. to a collection company for Ukrainian Refugees and for the victims of two large complex fires in Prince George's County.

We partnered with Knights of Peter Claver Ladies of Grace Chapter #47, to provide requested essentials like face masks, hand sanitizer, hygiene bags of soap, lotion, toothpaste, brush etc. and various snack items to Little Sisters of the Poor in Washington, DC.

Our mission continues to partner with Mount Calvary Sodality of the Blessed Virgin Mary providing Thanksgiving Food Baskets to families in need taken from calls to church, names from Ministry members and some of our Pantry clients. Our annual Christmas Basket Drive is on

Saturday, December 17, 2022. We provide food for a holiday meal and extra general staples since children and others are often home during the holidays. We are blessed to have food donated from the Parish, awesome Ladies of Charity and men and women volunteers that gather to pack all of the food bags, do shopping for items not donated and all coordinated by LOC Diane Harley and Janyce Ferguson. On the day of distribution we have volunteers from Bishop McNamara High School and Mt. Calvary Confirmation class candidates to carry bags to cars of clients. Our final project is to prepare 100+ bag lunches and breakfast items for Warm Nights (Emergency Hypothermia Homeless Shelter) sponsored by Community Crisis Services.

LOC OF ST. MARGARET OF SCOTLAND CELEBRATE A CENTENARIAN



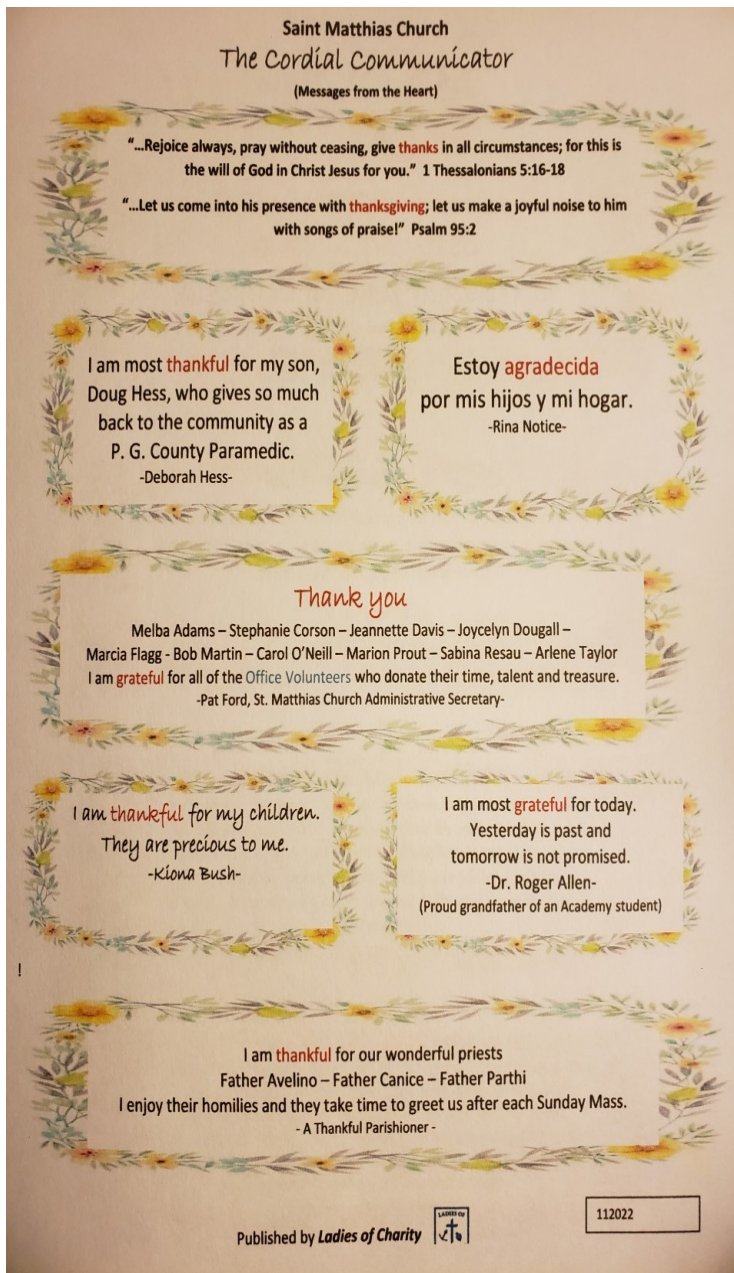

SHARING MESSAGES FROM THE HEART



Always exploring new and needed ways to further serve those in our church community, the Saint Matthias Ladies of Charity initiated the **Cordial Communicator**.

The **Cordial Communicator** is a bi-monthly message board comprised of short written submissions from parishioners to parishioners. Messages may include, but are not limited to: birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, weddings, notes of appreciation and upcoming events, get well wishes, condolences and notices of deaths. Each publication contains from 10 to 20 submissions printed on card-stock and inserted in the Sunday bulletin. The idea was initially a fundraiser for LOC to maintain regular monetary support for the remarkably busy food pantry and the ever-growing number of requests for financial aid and assistance from individuals, families, church-based and community organizations. However, the incoming donations have not proven to be sufficient. Yet, the many positive responses received from not only fellow parishioners, but also visitors and extended family members have been encouraging.

Since our first printing in May of 2022, we have printed over 5,000 issues! In addition to the general content for submissions, LOC has invited parishioners to write messages acknowledging specific themes and holidays.

For instance, in May - Mother's Day; in June - Father's Day and Graduations; in July and August - St. Matthias Church's 60th Anniversary; in October - Power of the Rosary; in November - Being Grateful; and, in December - Our Gift to God.

As proposed, The **Cordial Communicator** is a Ladies of Charity group supported program that has a one-year trial run. In May of 2023, we will revisit the project and determine whether to continue. Regardless of that decision, it is apparent that this spiritually motivating publication is having a wonderfully positive bonding impact on our Saint Matthias church community.

ARCHDIOCESE LOC ATTEND NATIONAL ASSEMBLY IN KNOXVILLE, TN

The Ladies of the Archdiocese of Washington attended the LCUSA National Assembly held from August 25—28 2022, in Knoxville, TN for its first in-person assembly since COVID-19. Everyone was extremely excited to actually see each other again.

The Assembly began with a Meet and Greet Reception with a theme of Jeans & Pearls which was attended by practically every attendee that arrived on Thursday, August 25. The “Official” opening of the Assembly began on Friday, August 26 with the Rosary and Opening Mass at the Immaculate Conception Church, adjacent to the Host Hotel followed by Opening Ceremonies and workshops throughout the day. The Silent Auction was opened each day for attendees to make their “bids”. Throughout the Assembly there was an Exhibit Hall of vendors and Showcase of Projects from various LOC units, including: LOC of Chattanooga, Layette Program; English Language Learners-Access Cultural Diversity; Sustainable Food Pantry for University Students and Volunteer Ministry Center.

The following Workshops covered concerns of National Interest:

1. Widening the Frame: Expanding Perspectives on the impact of Poverty

St. Josephine was born in Darfur, Sudan in 1869. Her father, a semi-nomadic herdsman, was a well-respected member of the Daju tribe. Widowed when Josephine was only two years old, he provided her with a happy and relatively prosperous childhood. During the family's migration within Sudan, Josephine, then about nine years old, was captured by Arab slave traders, and subsequently, her life of bondage began.

In captivity she was forced to walk barefoot for 600 miles and was sold several times in the course of 12 years. Some owners treated her well. Several did not, one owner beating her severely and scarring her for life. Her path to freedom and safety began the day a Turkish general sold her to an Italian Consul serving in Sudan.

When the Consul planned to return to Italy, Josephine dared to ask him to take her along. Consenting, he did so, and in time gave her as a gift to be a nanny for the daughter of an Italian friend. As a nanny, she accompanied the daughter to a school conducted by the Canossian Daughters of Charity. During her mistress's absence on a trip, she was placed in the custody of the Sisters. Upon her mistress's return, Josephine refused to return to the family and remained with the Sisters. Providentially she was granted freedom by an Italian court of law.

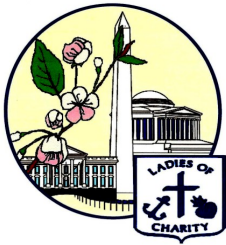
As a child, Josephine had reveled in the beauty of the natural surroundings of her home. She had often wondered who created such magnificence. In Italy in the company of the Sisters, she found her answer: God. "Bakhita", the name ironically given to her by her captors, in Arabic

means "the fortunate one". Having experienced God's mercy to her, she could thank her captives, for had she not been kidnapped, she might not ever have come to know Jesus Christ nor have entered the Church. After years of enslavement, she was unable to remember her original name. In 1890 she was baptized Josephine Margaret Fortunata.

Josephine entered the Canossian Sisters in 1893, serving as cook and doorkeeper for 42 years. Known for her gentle voice and smile, when asked how she was, now as a "slave" of Christ, she would answer, "As the Master desires." At the close of her life, she re-lived the sufferings of her enslavement and was heard to cry out repeatedly, "Please loosen the chains . . . they are heavy". Josephine died on Feb. 8, 1947, was canonized in 2000 by Pope John Paul II, and proclaimed patron saint of Sudan and trafficking.
