

"We greatly deceive ourselves if we think we can attain perfection by our own efforts and by con-

stantly and closely watching over all the movements and dispositions of our souls. It is a good thing, once a year, to apply ourselves seriously to this kind of examination while being duly distrustful of ourselves and recognizing our weaknesses. But to put ourselves through a continual purgatory to analyze our souls and to give an account of all our thoughts is useless, even dangerous. I am repeating to you what I was told long ago. I beg you, ... to help me by your prayers, as I will help you by mine, so that we may obtain from God the grace to walk simply and confidently along the path of His holy love, without too much introspection, lest we resemble those persons who, instead of growing rich, become bankrupt while striving to find the philosopher's stone. We can be certain that the divine goodness will not withhold grace from us if we come simply and with the desire to do God's will". (with some paraphrasing)

I suspect this advice may had been given to Louise, who tended to much introspection in her early years, by St Vincent. Louise learned to accept her limitations and came to realize that God accepts us as we are, both our good and bad points. Vincent freed her of her inner worries so that she could use her wonderful gifts of management skills, organization, persuasion, spiritual insights to assure that many of the poverties of her time, so like our realities today, war, famine, epidemics (plague, cholera, small pox), child abandonment, mass migration of people, disregard of women.

So, in this time of the pandemic, just remember you are attempting to alleviate the suffering of many who directly or indirectly are impacted by the virus. In St Vincent's writings, there are 300 mentions of the plague. You are in GOOD COMPANY with Vincent and Louise, your founders and God is with you all at this time. What is your New Year's Resolution going to be???

Dear Ladies of Charity,

May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

As you all know Pope Francis recently signed his encyclical "Fratelli Tutti" while visiting Assisi on the Feast of St. Francis, October 4th. In our effort to "think with the Church" I encourage you

each, individually and communally, to read and reflect on this important document for our current time and in light of the good work each of you are engaged in. I would like to offer here a few brief thoughts on the encyclical and highlight some areas for your reflections as Ladies of Charity.

While there are many media-worthy and twee-table lines in the document it is, at a deeper level, a work of spiritual reflection and discernment. It is a call or an exhortation for the world and each Christian to move and engage in relationships and friend-ships rather than the current tendency of disposability and indifference to the other. To do this Pope Francis reflects on the good Samaritan parable and invites us to think about which character we identify with or resemble. In the end we are left with the question: Will we bend down to touch and heal the wounds of others?

For those of us living and ministering in the United States the letter pulls us back from the tendency toward nationalism. It is interesting to note that the word "walls" appears 14 times as a symbol of our temptation to shut ourselves off from the needs of others.

As we end this year of 2020 with all its challenges and need for isolation this call of Francis and this encyclical is timely. As we strive, walking in the charism of St. Vincent de Paul to commit ourselves to seeking freedom from injustice, oppression and poverty and the restoration relationships between people and God, we can find ample material here to guide and sustain us in this goal.

In closing, I use the prayer that ends the encyclical. May this prayer be our prayer:

A Prayer to the Creator

Lord, Father of our human family,
you created all human beings equal in dignity:
pour forth into our hearts a fraternal spirit
and inspire in us a dream of renewed encounter,
dialogue, justice and peace.
Move us to create healthier societies
and a more dignified world,
a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war.

May our hearts be open
to all the peoples and nations of the earth.
May we recognize the goodness and beauty
that you have sown in each of us,
and thus forge bonds of unity, common projects,
and shared dreams. Amen.

"THE MAKING OF A CARDINAL" ARCHBISHOP OF WASHINGTON WILTON D. GREGORY 1ST AFRICAN-AMERICAN U.S. CARDINAL

Cardinal Wilton D. Gregory, Archdiocese of Washington

On October 25, 2020, Pope Francis named Archbishop of Washington Wilton D. Gregory as one of 13 new cardinals from around the world, to be elevated to the College of Cardinals on November 28, 2020 in Rome. Cardinal Gregory became the First African-American Cardinal in the history of the Catholic Church in the United States.

Cardinal Wilton D. Gregory was ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Chicago in 1973 and was named an auxiliary bishop in 1983. He was named Bishop of Belleville in 1994 where he served for eleven years before being named by Pope John Paul II as the sixth Archbishop of Atlanta in 2005. Archbishop Gregory was named by Pope Francis as the seventh Archbishop of Washington in 2019.

Cardinal Wilton Daniel Gregory was born December 7, 1947 in Chicago to Wilton Sr. and Ethel Duncan Gregory; he has two sisters, Elaine and Claudia. He attended St. Carthage Grammar School, where he converted to Catholicism. He attended Quigley Preparatory Seminary South, Niles College (now St. Joseph's College Seminary) of Loyola University and St. Mary of the Lake Seminary.

He was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago on May 9, 1973, and three years after his ordination began graduate studies at the Pontifical Liturgical Institute (Sant' Anselmo) in Rome. There he earned his doctorate in sacred liturgy in 1980.

After having served as an associate pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Glenview, IL as a member of the faculty of St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in Mundelein and as a master of ceremonies to Cardinals John Cody and Joseph Bernardin, he was ordained an auxiliary bishop of Chicago on December 13, 1983. On February 10, 1994, he was installed as the seventh Bishop of the Diocese of Belleville, IL where he served for the next eleven years. On December 9, 2004, Pope Saint John Paul II appointed Bishop Gregory as the sixth Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Atlanta. He was installed on January 17, 2005. In April 2019 Pope Francis appointed Gregory Archbishop of Washington, to succeed Donald Cardinal Wuerl, who resigned amid allegations that he had covered up sexual misconduct. Gregory was installed the following month, on May 21, 2019, becoming the first African-American to hold the post.

Cardinal Gregory has served in many leading roles in the U.S. church. In November 2001, he was elected president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) following three years as vice president under Bishop Joseph Fiorenza of the Diocese of Galveston-Houston. During his tenure in office, the crisis of sex abuse by Catholic clergy escalated; and under his leadership, the bishops implemented the "Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People."

He has served on the USCCB'S Executive and Administrative Committees, the Administrative Board, the Committee on Doctrine and the U.S. Catholic Conference Committee on International Policy. He previously served as the chairman of the Bishops' Committees on Personnel, Divine Worship and the Third Millennium/ Jubilee Year 2000 from 1998-2001, and Liturgy from 1991-1993. Cardinal Gregory has written extensively on church issues, including pastoral statements on the death penalty, euthanasia/physician-assisted suicide and has published numerous articles on the subject of liturgy, particularly in the African-American community. He has been the recipient of nine honorary doctoral degrees, just to name a few of his many accolades.

The Ladies of Charity congratulate Cardinal Wilton D. Gregory on a well-deserved elevation in the Catholic Church.

This past January I began as a board member (I completed Dr. Rita Robinson seat on the board in 2019). I serve on the Long Term Planning Committee which addressed clarifying our mission, vision and lessons learned. As a business we are a work in progress. As a Home Care Agency we focus on providing for the spiritual and corporal

needs of persons who are sick, elderly or disabled while providing a living wage for our caregivers who assist them and the family members of our clients.

Opening a branch of the Ladies of Charity Caregiving, Inc. in the Archdiocese of Washington is a possibility as we grow. Providing caregivers whose mission is that of a total caring of all parties based in the Gospel will be a benefit to all. dinners from 10:00 am—4:00 pm to the community. The dinners included roast turkey, dressing, gravy, macaroni & cheese, green beans, candied sweet potatoes, rolls, sweet potato pie, and drink. Additionally, each bag contained a package of masks and hand sanitizer.

Thanks to Pastor, Very Rev. Michael Thompson, SSJ for his commitment to providing food for those in our community and working to ensure that the dinner took place as well as Donna Hawkins for being the lead coordinator. Gratitude and blessings to all the volunteers who gave of their time, talent and treasure in making this event a success!



























ST. MATTHIAS LOC CONTINUES TO SERVE DURING PANDEMIC

Amid pandemic restrictions and Zoom meetings, the St. Matthias Ladies of Charity still found creative ways to serve their community. After the initial shut down of our pantry because of the pandemic, we transferred many of our pantry staples to the neighboring St. Hugh pantry and made a monetary donation to assist them. We are happy to say that our parish pantry is back up and running serving the needy in our community.

With the shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) needed by medical personnel and first responders, our unit purchased \$500 worth of additional masks and protective shields that were distributed to the Sacred Heart Nursing home in Hyattsville, the St. Matthias Academy school in Lanham, and the Prince Georges County Department of Fire Protection for the fire and EMS personnel at the Lanham and Glenn Dale Fire Departments.

In October, we collected cases of water that were donated to "Maria's Meals," which is a Catholic Charities' initiative providing nutritious food for low income families for distribution at their Tuesday evening meals in Forestville, MD.

In November, our LOC partnered with the Knights of Columbus and several other parish organizations for a food drive that distributed over 400 boxes of food in our church parking lot to the needy.

Before the shutdown, our unit participated in several sessions of "The Global Peace Initiative" held after our monthly meetings, but were unable to complete the program because of the pandemic. The Global Peace Initiative is an international program which strives to unite people of different faiths and backgrounds. Two members in our unit went on to earn certificates in the program, and we hope to use this training to serve others.

We were able to again provide Thanksgiving baskets to families that requested them and sponsor our parish Giving Tree benefiting three local charities in our area. We also made a donation to the Sacred Heart building fund as they update and expand their facility.

CALVERT COUNTY LADIES OF CHARITY FEED SENIORS

The Ladies of Charity Calvert County hold an on-site pantry event at the North Beach Senior Center Apartments once a month. We found that some of our clients who lived at the apartment complex had great difficulty getting to the pantry and bringing groceries home afterwards. Our Pantry Manager, Barbara Glover, came up with the idea of taking the pantry to the clients instead. The manager of the apartments worked with us to set up space in the common area with tables where we could organize the types of groceries to choose from, and to set up a monthly schedule, and menu of grocery items. Our volunteers meet at the Food Pantry, load up cars with the groceries, drive a few blocks to the apartments, unload the groceries and set up the food on the tables.

At the mini market, we are able to provide fresh produce, meat, canned vegetables and fruit, cereal, pasta, peanut butter and bread. For the first year, we were able to hold the mini market indoors. The apartment residents very much appreciated the mini market. We then extended the concept to deliver our holiday baskets directly to the apartment residents, with the help of the girl scouts.

After COVID we moved the mini market to a large covered porch on the front of the apartment building. So far the weather has been mild to hot. With COVID extending through the winter months, we will have to bundle up!

In addition to the Giving Tree portion of the Christmas Project, the LOC provided a copy of the Josephite 2021 Calendar, a turkey and \$50 Giant Foods Gift Card for each family. The clients were very happy. One client in particular presented a card of appreciation to the Church for the kindness given to his family.

Thank you to our Pastor, Very Rev. Michael Thompson, SSJ for allowing the LOC to continue its tradition of serving the neediest in the community at Christmas during this pandemic. Kudos to all those who worked extremely hard and safe to make this Annual Event a success!



The day started with breakfast (in-person) at 9:00 am; First Talk from 9:30-10:30am; Meditation from 10:30-11:30; Recitation of the Rosary from 11:30-12:00pm; Mass at 12:10pm; Lunch 12:45-1:30pm; Second Talk from 1:30-2:30pm; 2:30-3:00pm Adoration; and Mass at 4:00pm.

"Fall Cleaning" of the soul was the activity for the day. Fr. Greg gave hand-outs showing a 4 bedroom model home with floor plans of the 1st and 2nd levels of the home, naming each room on each level (kitchen, living room, bedroom, etc.). Then, he

gave us floor plans showing a home for the soul. The rooms were labeled on the 1st floor (faith, hope, charity, prudence, patience, justice, temperance and fortitude). The 2nd floor rooms were named (chastity, meekness, humility and generosity).

The rooms of the soul are the "7 habits of highly effective Christian people." Virtues lead to happiness, freedom; means between extremes; and who we are and want to be. **PRUDENCE** is the guide for all the virtues; take the appropriate action (slow down for speed cameras); **JUSTICE** give to everyone what is due them (returning extra money from cashier); **FORTITUDE** courage to be Catholic (defending Church teaching); **TEMPER-ANCE** moderation with pleasures, food, drink (having one or two donuts only); **FAITH** conviction of things not seen that affects our daily lives (Daily prayer); **HOPE** trust in Jesus ("God will provide"); and **CHARITY** love of God and neighbor (saying only good things about others; no gossip).

On the 2nd floor of the soul are **CHASTITY** sexual and emotional purity (watching safe/neutral shows and reading safe/neutral literature; take custody of the eyes; control images brought in the mind); **MEEK-NESS** control of resentments and anger (forgiving others); **GENEROS-ITY** giving of time, talent and treasure (volunteering); **HUMILITY** honesty (giving thanks to God daily for everything); and **PATIENCE** persistence (keep praying; never give up).

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. You have faith * in God; have faith also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If there were not, would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you?

And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back again and take you to myself, so that where I am you also may be. Where I am going you know the way."

Thomas said to him, "Master, we do not know where you are going; how can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

Servant of God Father Augustus Tolton (1854 - 1897)

Father Augustus Tolton was born into slavery in Missouri, where he escaped with his mother and siblings by crossing the Mississippi River into freed Illinois. Impressed by Augustus' intelligence and piety, several priests tried to get him into the seminary which proved to be impossible. In 1880, Augustus began his priestly studies in Rome. He was ordained a priest on April 24, 1886. He is recognized as the first Black American priest. Fr. Tolton celebrated his first Mass in Quincy, Illinois before a large crowd of whites and blacks. The next day he was assigned to pastor St. Joseph Church, a small poor black parish. Although his priesthood was hampered by isolation and economic hardship, Fr. Tolton remained a symbol of fidelity and priestly dignity. Pastor of St. Monica in Chicago, Fr. Tolton became the spiritual leader of the 19th century National Black Catholic Congress. He died at Mercy Hospital, a victim of heatstroke, on July 9, 1897.

Servant of God Father Augustus Tolton lived a spirit-filled life. Let us pray:

Prayer for the Canonization of Father Augustus Tolton

O God, we give you thanks for your servant and priest, Father Augustus Tolton, who labored among us in times of contradiction, times that were both beautiful and paradoxical. His ministry helped lay the foundation for a truly Catholic gathering in faith in our time. We stand in the shadow of his ministry. May his life continue to inspire us and imbue us with the confidence and hope that will forge a new evangelization for the Church we love.

Father in Heaven, Father Tolton's suffering service sheds light upon our sorrows; we see them through the prism of your Son's passion and death. If it be your Will, O God, glorify your servant, Father Tolton, by granting the favor I now request through his intercession (mention your request) so that all may know the goodness of this priest whose memory looms large in the Church he loved.

Complete what you have begun in us that we might work for the fulfillment of your kingdom. Not to us the glory, but glory to you O God, through Jesus Christ, your Son and our Lord; Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are our God, living and reigning forever and ever. Amen
