#### Statement on the Death of George Floyd

We, the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul USA, unite our hearts, voices, prayers, presence, and action with those of people of goodwill around the globe in affirming that black lives matter.

We. Are. Outraged.

The charity of Christ impels us to speak out, as yet another black man has died at the hands of law enforcement. Actions by those in authority in our law enforcement system reveal again and again a broken system of chronic racism that hurts humanity.

We call for an immediate cessation of racist actions against people of color by all in positions of authority including all levels of law enforcement, legal systems, and governments. We call for national systemic change eradicating racism and eliminating white supremacy and white privilege.

We. Are. In solidarity.

When a sister or brother begs for help, begs for life, begs for air, begs to be released, and ultimately succumbs to death due to asphyxiation, we all symbolically suffocate. Our hearts ache with sorrow for Mr. Floyd's friends and family, some still too young to comprehend the magnitude of the appalling circumstances resulting in their father's unjust and agonizing death at the hands of out of control law enforcement.

We applaud Minnesota Attorney General, Keith Ellison, and the Minnesota legal system for taking firm action to indict all four officers involved covertly or overtly in the death of our brother, George Floyd.

We. Are. Committed to Action.

As women given to God, in community, to serve Christ in the those who are poor, we pledge to confront racism within ourselves and where we encounter it. We pledge to live Catholic Social Teaching. We join with others in the faith community in acknowledging our own complicity in institutional racism and we ask forgiveness of our sisters and brothers of color. We pledge to join others in building the Kingdom of God.

### FOOD PANTRY HELPING FAMILIES DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The Ladies of Charity of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church along with their Pastor, Very Reverend Michael Thompson, S.S.J. volunteer in the food pantry every Thursday from 9:30 AM — 1:30 PM. The pantry is open to the community from 10:30 AM — 12:30 PM.

On an average, the volunteers provide food for approximately 150 persons per week. However, during the recent COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic, there has been an upsurge in the need for food. Since the pandemic, approximately, 350 persons are being provided food weekly. The demand is high due to loss of employment and the CDC stay-at-home lockdown to try and control the virus. Families are really suffering.

Typically, each family receives food for at least 3 days. The average number of persons in a family is four. They receive fresh produce, meat, non-perishables (canned vegetables; cereal; milk; pasta; tuna; soup; canned fruit; peanut butter/jelly; rice; beans); and, bread/baked goods, if available. The food pantry has become a lifeline for the community, but resources are dwindling. With prayer, faith and hope — God will provide.

# LEADERS OF THE VINCENTIAN FAMILY TRAVEL TO ROME



**F**r. Mike Barth, S.T. addresses his Cenacle Family in a letter to his brothers, as follows. . .

Dear Brothers,

May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

I shared with you last month that myself, Fr. Raphael and Pat Regan would be attending, in Rome, a gathering of the global leadership of the Vincentian Family. Now that we have returned, I want to share with you some insights from this gathering and my thoughts on how we should move forward.

Gathering with the leaders of over 95 of the more than 120 branches was both stimulating and challenging. Like us, many of the branches gathered were not founded by St. Vincent de Paul or St. Louise but by followers of Vincent, those moved by his charism and spirituality, like Fr. Judge. Each branch, following their own unique charism, is living the larger charism in unique ways. There was no attempt to try to merge these unique charisms but rather invite those gathered to collaborate, in the spirit of St. Vincent, becoming an enormous power for good in the world for the alleviation of poverty. The lay branches gathered, the MCA in the person of Pat Regan, have and will continue to play a most vital role in moving both our own and the larger Vincentian charism forward into the future.

My takeaway from the gathering is a desire for us to move closer in our relationship to

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

the Vincentian Family. This does not diminish us or the unique contribution we have to offer. The Vincentian Family is proud of us and desires to embrace both the legacy of Fr. Judge and the unique vision he had of St. Vincent's call to us and our Cenacle Family. The Council and I will look at ways that we can, both on the national and local level, be more intentional in our connections and possible collaboration with the Vincentian Family. I encourage you, on the local level, to investigate and be open to ways in which you may move this forward on our behalf.

Some other highlights of the visit to Rome were the opportunity I had to have a private visit with Pope Francis. I was able to gift him a copy of the biography of Fr. Judge, "Every Catholic an Apostle", ask him for prayers for each of us and our donors and to pray for our centennial efforts. While assuring me of his prayers and blessing he did ask us all to pray daily for him. In addition to this, both Raphael and I were able to celebrate Mass one day at the Tomb at St. Peter – thanking God for each of you, and again praying for our benefactors and vocations.

At the closing of the Conference, Fr. Tomas, the Superior General of the Vincentians, presented each of the Superiors gathered a relic

### ST. HUGH/GREENBELT COMMUNITY GROWS STRONGER DURING COVID-19

The St. Hugh Ladies of Charity were determined to keep providing food to those in need in the greater Greenbelt area throughout these challenging times. When the "stay at home" order was issued by Gov. Larry Hogan, the St. Hugh LOC members talked with their pastor, Fr. Walter Tappe, to review the order. The order indicated that charitable organizations were exempt and volunteers could continue to provide services, i.e. food pantries to the community. Fr. Walter said "you need to stay open because the community needs our pantry more than ever now." The St. Hugh Pantry distributes food through the rectory staff Monday through Friday, 9am-2pm. One of

the rectory staff members needed to work from home due to having a child out of school. An LOC member volunteered to work her 2 days at the rectory so that food distribution could continue 5 days a week.

The St. Hugh LOC got word out to the community through the Greenbelt News Review about the

pantry remaining open. The community responded and increased their Coop Grocery Store \$5 donation bags to 60-70 bags a week that go to the pantry. The community also started giving the St. Hugh LOC, Coop Grocery Store Gift Cards valued from \$25-\$100 to be given to pantry recipients to help them buy perishable foods. The community has donated over \$10,000 in gift cards to date. Many people used their stimulus checks to buy gift cards. The Greenbelt City Council also worked with the Greenbelt Cares Office to utilize the Interfaith Good Samaritan Fund to collect commu-

nity monetary donations to be given to St. Hugh Church for the pantry. Over \$3,600 has been donated through this vehicle to the pantry to purchase food. The local Elks Organization donated \$2,000 to the pantry.

Using the St. Hugh Church on-line communication system, Flock Notes, we held the Lenten Food Drive virtually. Parishioners either donated funds through check/Faith Direct to LOC to buy food or dropped off needed food items to the rectory outside food container.

St. Hugh LOC volunteers set up a safe way to prepare pantry food bags each week. They utilize 4-6 volunteers who are social distancing and using masks while preparing bags. The pantry family recipients have grown from 20 families to over 60 families a week being served. The volunteers (Barbara Hamilton, pantry coordinator, Linda Kelley and Joseph Panossinan) increased their bag preparation days from one day to two days a week. The LOC volunteer shoppers (Ellen Hanyok and Mary Ann Tretler) go 1-2 days a week to the new Lidl Store in Greenbelt to supplement the food provided through the Coop Store. We have been able to get the quantities of food we need at Lidl's without any restrictions. Shoppers there will stop

us and say you must be shopping for a food pantry and frequently they hand us money to help buy food. LOC Volunteer, Peggy Compton, picks up donated bags at Coop Store 2x a week. LOC volunteers, Suzanne and Joe Lomax, prepare 40 "kid friendly" bags (Goldfish crackers, pudding, peanut butter crackers, gummie fruits, etc.) each Friday for the pantry. LOC Volunteers also deliver food bags to those homebound and make special arrangements for pantry families that aren't able to come due to work schedules during the week for food. We also have a volunteer translator, Mirsa Shulma, who contacts Spanish recipients that don't speak English to arrange food pick up.

During this very difficult time for many families it has been heartwarming and a great blessing to experience the incredible generosity of the Greater Greenbelt/St. Hugh Community. Pantry families with tears in their eyes express their profound gratitude for the food/gift cards and knowing that the community cares about them.


### ST. MATTHIAS THE APOSTLE LOC ANNUAL RETREAT

# ST. IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA LADIES OF CHARITY START PANDEMIC FOOD DRIVE

The Ladies of St. Ignatius in January delivered toiletries that were collected thru the last half of 2019 to *Each One Feed One*, an organization that provides food and personal hygiene items to the homeless and the elderly.

In February, we held our annual baby shower to help the Forestville Pregnancy Center and Elizabeth Arms. Our sewing group supplied us with an overwhelming number of handmade blankets, sweaters, hats, and booties. We also collected diapers, clothing, and baby toiletries. This is our 8th year for this baby drive, and we are incredibly happy with the amount of goods we were able to give to both centers.

At the end of March, our ladies helped our parish priest make phone calls to all parishioners in our two parishes. Our goal was to check to see if they were doing ok during the pandemic and to see if they needed groceries or medicine.

Our Lenten food drive was cancelled in March due to COVID-19, so beginning on April 1st with the help of our parish priest, we started our Pandemic Food Drive. We sent out email letters to parishioners from both of our parishes to







collect money for the local food pantries. We were very blessed to receive over \$4,500. We were able to help numerous pantries, shelters, & nursing homes in the area that have a greater need than normal due to the virus.

As things try to get back to some normalcy in the second half of 2020, we as Ladies of Charity, will do what we can to help our neighbors in need.

## DEDICATION OF THE MOSAIC OF BLESSED FREDERIC OZANAM

On January 26, 2020, the Sunday of Word of God -The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Dedication of the Mosaic of Frederic Blessed Ozanam took place at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. The Principal Celebrant and Homilist was His Excellence Most Rever-

end Donald J. Hying, Bishop of Madison and National Episcopal Advisor, National Counsel of the United States Society of Saint Vincent de Paul.

The Blessed Frederic Ozanam mosaic is located on the Saint Vincent de Paul side of the Miraculous Medal Chapel in the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC.

Frederic had a deep devotion to Mary and he chose Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception as the Patroness of the Society of Saint St. Vincent de Paul, so it was indeed appropriate that his mosaic has been installed in this chapel. Frederic also lived in Paris at the time of the apparitions of Mary to Saint Catherine Laboure, a Daughter of Charity, when Mary requested that the Medal of the Immaculate Conception be created. So many miracles came through this devotion to Mary, that the medal became known as the "Miraculous Medal." Frederic would have received one of the first Miraculous Medals and it is said that he had a medal in his pocket at the time of his death.

#### PRESENTATION ON ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE

**D**uring the January 2020 monthly meeting of St. Matthias the Apostle Ladies of Charity, Ms. Nancy Quarles, Program and Services Manager for the Alzheimer's Association of the National Capital Area that serves DC, Maryland and Virginia, gave a slide presentation and discussion on the "10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's."

Alzheimer's disease falls under the umbrella of Dementia which also includes Vascular Dementia, Lewy Body Dementia, and Frontotemporal Dementia. Alzheimer's is the most common form of the disease and comprises 70% of Dementia cases. Slides included commentaries from doctors and other experts on the 10 warning signs:

- 1. Memory loss that disrupts life;
- 2. challenges in planning and solving problems;
- 3. difficulty in performing familiar tasks;
- 4. confusion with time or place;
- 5. trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships;
- 6. new problems with words in speaking or writing;
- 7. misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps;
- 8. decreased or poor judgment;
- 9. withdrawal from work or social activities; and,
- 10.changes in mood or personality.

The slides also included things that are a part of normal aging and are not Dementia. The importance of early detection was emphasized, and while the disease is not curable, early detection is important for the patient to play a role in their future health planning. Ms. Quarles talked about the Association itself and the type of things that they do. Certain groups are more susceptible—African Americans, Hispanics, and women are all more prone to the disease. She had a question and answer session following the presentation; and, handouts and contact information were provided.

# AIC CONTINUES ITS WORK DURING PANDEMIC

The actions of AIC volunteers around the world continue to show that however difficult the situation, it is always possible to keep helping those in need.





France: Strasbourg, Tarbes

Like many European countries, **France** has been badly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, and it is those living in poverty who are most vulnerable to its economic impacts. The AIC volunteers are aware of this, and in various towns across the country (Strasbourg, Verdun, Saint-Valéry-en-Caux, Tarbes and others), they have continued their food bank services to the families that rely on them, adapting the way they work to respect social distancing and hygiene measures. Some volunteers are also making masks for those who need them. The volunteers have the support of the local authorities and the beneficiaries are reassured to see their familiar friendly faces at this particularly difficult time.



France: Châtillon-sur-Chalaronne

In Châtillon-sur-Chalaronne, where St Vincent set up the first Charity in 1617, and where the AIC International Assembly was held 400 years later, the AIC volunteers have continued supporting vulnerable elderly people. They stay in touch with them by phone or in writing, according to each person's capabilities, and they have sent homemade masks and greetings cards with words of comfort, poems or Bible verses.

In **Germany**, AIC volunteers are also doing what they can during the COVID-19 crisis. The project "Postcards for phone calls" involves sending postcards mentioning the name and phone number of the sender to establish contact with people who might be lonely or require assistance. In the project "Open doors against loneliness", volunteers are sewing reusable masks, which they attach to

front doors with greetings, as home visits are not allowed. Some inspiring work!

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In **Madagascar**, food distribution to disadvantaged families continues. The AIC volunteers from Fianarantsoa are teaching mothers to sew their own reusable masks.

In the **USA**, some AIC volunteers in New York have been supporting isolated women in a local assisted living facility, sending them sweet treats and flowers for Mothers' Day. The Junior volunteers (girls aged 8-18) have been chipping in by making masks for the residents.

In **Mexico** too, the AIC volunteers have

adapted their services and are distributing food to people who are homeless or have lost their jobs, families of detainees, and those living on the outskirts of cities, who are the most affected by the crisis.
