

Son and Holy Spirit. But, most of all we honor and remember our many deceased Ladies of Charity who spent numerous years supporting the disadvantaged, homeless and hungry in their community.

"WE RENEW" Each time we have a Solemn Reception of New Members, the new members are asked to pray <u>The Act of Consecration</u>. It states that they accept the invitation to serve victims of poverty in many forms. Once a Lady of Charity, also, we say this prayer, if in attendance, as a renewal of our commitment to service in the community.

"WE REBUILD" Recently, I sent to the LCUSA, the 2020 Association Annual Report of all the information I received from the parish units in the Archdiocese of Washington. We have 17 parish units, 350 Ladies of Charity and worked 59,508 volunteer hours. We have lost 4 parish units in the past 4 years due to age, dwindling interest and reluctance to take leadership roles. Our member and parish numbers are declining, so we must rebuild by having a recruitment drive throughout the Archdiocese. Please pray for its success, so we can continue to serve our community the best we can.

As I close this message, I am honored to know all the Ladies of Charity in our area, and applaud all of the parish units for the work done throughout the many years, especially during this pandemic. You all are awesome! Have a great and healthy summer, and I will see you in August.

THE YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH - 2021

Pope Francis, in a new Apostolic Letter entitled Patris Corde ("With a Father's Heart") has called for a year dedicated to St. Joseph. Francis highlights St. Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an accepting father, a father who is creatively courageous,

a working father, and a father in the shadows.

The Letter marks the 150th anniversary of Pope Pius IX's declaration of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To celebrate the anniversary, Pope Francis has proclaimed a special "Year of St. Joseph," that began in December 2020 and extends to the Feast of the Immaculate Conception in 2021.

Francis holds up Joseph as a saint our world dramatically needs — a simple carpenter from Nazareth who knew who he was and reverenced the ancient Jewish traditions from which he had come. He struggled to discover and obey God's call in his life no matter what the cost. He loved Mary, his wife, selflessly and confronted threats of violence against his family with courage.

St. Vincent had a great devotion to St. Joseph and in many conferences mentions the qualities of St. Joseph that we should emulate. While St. Vincent's devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary is well known, Vincent did on various occasions — in letters and conversations refer to the example of St. Joseph. Vincent would call on this great saint imploring him to send good workers to the Company. He saw Joseph as a model of hard work and wanted his followers to work hard, like Joseph, to avoid idleness. Vincent reminded his follows to be like Joseph, to say little and do much!

Let us pray then to St. Joseph as Vincent did, to send good workers to our Company to continue our ministry to those most in need. On May 9, we celebrated the Feast of St. Louise de Marillac. What a striking resemblance to our present reality today was the time in which she lived: constant war, young widows whose husbands went off to war or who died of illnesses, unemployment, lack of peace. In Vincent's writings, he has 300 mentions of plague.

In the midst of our strikingly familiar reality, we are still plowing through not just 40 days in the COVID desert but as the editor of Give Us This Day made me aware, it is close to more than



460+ days in the desert of COVID. How do we do our work as Ladies of Charity during these challenging times? Perhaps this pandemic offers us time to reflect on and renew our good efforts and intentions. This time has given us all lots more time to look at our reality, both past,

present, and even future. Louise's disciplined and orderly routine each day might be helpful for us to imitate. What did her day look like?

- Manual labor that she would do "cheerfully". This included what we might consider hobbies today, artistic creation (she loved to paint), embroidery, and other needlework that allowed her to remain mindful, reflective, and attentive to the needs of her soul.
- Household tasks, along with "charitable works, social obligations, calling on our sickly and lonely neighbors, soup kitchen, clothes closet ministry while still staying safe.
- Prayer in order to nurture interior attitudes ("adoration", "thanksgiving", abandonment of my will", "confidence", "recollection through meditation on the Gospel", "readings from the lives of these saints", "prayers to Mary" and "quick moments of remembering that God is present in my life").

At the end of each day, she spent time in prayer "trusting always in God's aoodness and mercy" with quick review of her day when would call to mind "the graces which (she) may have received from God during the day",

and ask pardon for "the faults which (she) may have committed."

We know that Louise had a long affliction of suffering which left significant traces of sadness in her heart. I suspect that she experienced "black moments of despair", but with Vincent's help, overtime her ministerial activity expanded but during this time, she was also to more clearly and confidently look at her attitudes, tastes, inclinations, preferences which influenced her actions.

Vincent, knowing that joy brings the best out of a person, often sent Louise reminders to move beyond her sadness: "remain in good spirits", "be quite cheerful", "do what you have to do in a cheerful way", "live peacefully... in joy". These reminders took hold. She wrote to Vincent around 1650, in her old age, "My heart is still overflowing with joy because the understanding which, I believe, our good God has given me of the words 'God is my God' and the awareness I had of the glory which the blessed render to Him as a consequence of this truth. Therefore, I cannot help communicating with you this evening to ask you to assist me to profit from this excess of joy and to suggest some practice for me."

As Ladies of Charity, may each of our hearts overflow with joy as we face the summer and fall of 2021! Stay safe and continue your wonderful service to others!

Prior to COVID, the St. Gabriel LOC contemplated starting a Parish Food Pantry. Then, due to COVID-19, we had to think of another creative way to provide support to the community, when they needed it the most. So, the Ladies came up with another way to provide food for those in need. That idea became the Grab and Go Project. The idea was the Ladies would provide plastic containers containing non-perishable food items as well as carry bags. Having obtained the "go ahead" from the Parish Priest, flyers were posted and plastic containers placed at the front and side entrances of the Church (there was one Mass on Saturday and one on Sunday). The Ladies filled the containers and provided carry bags. Upon entering or leaving Church, food was available for anyone in need. Just "Grab and Go".

At our December meeting, we limited the time spent on business topics so the 20+ attendees could assemble the gifts. A "caravan" of Ladies delivered the gifts to the Calvert Nursing Center The Ladies of Charity Calvert County became aware of a need at the Calvert Nursing Center, which has many low-income residents. One of the resident's daughters had posted an article on Facebook that sounded like a desperate call for help. We decided to form a committee and put together a Christmas gift bag for each of 120 residents.

We contacted the facility manager to determine what gifts would be most appreciated. She indicated that the residents had had an extra rough year, with COVID restrictions limiting personal contact. She indicated that blankets, warm socks, personal items and snacks would be well received. Our volunteer committee jumped into action to create 120



CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY FOOD BASKETS FOR FOOD PANTRY CLIENTS

The Ladies of Charity Calvert County have had this event for many years, but this year COVID gave us many challenges as well as extra blessings. As far as blessings, the Maryland Food Bank was able to provide over 200 turkeys, so we were able to serve many more clients. However, COVID restrictions led to a complete redesign of the event. In prior years we did the distribution in the church hall, with coffee and danish, in a very social event where clients came early to visit with each other before picking up their groceries.

This year we had to move the entire event to the church parking lot, including directing traffic for hundreds of clients, check-in to verify sign up, staging of the various food components of the grocery basket — frozen items, fresh produce items, and non-perishable items, loading of client cars, and getting clients safely back on the road. We also had to limit volunteers to those who were able to stand in the cold for many hours.

Our pantry manager, Barbara Glover, and her design team came up with a very efficient model to move the clients through the process quickly and safely within a couple of hours on the Saturday before Christmas. We served 269 families representing 732 individuals. About a dozen clients who had not signed up were able to get a Holiday food Basket at the end of the morning when we knew how many "no shows" we had.








Lastly, St. Hugh LOC members in cooperation with a Greenbelt community group, RUAK, and management staff at the Franklin Park Apartments started a monthly on-site food pantry bags distribution at Franklin Park on March 12th. The management staff identified 30 families in need. The families not only received food but also a \$25 Giant gift card and donated children's books from RUAK members. There is a Giant Food Store in walking distance from the apartments.

Sister Thea Bowman F.S.P.A., Ph D (1937 – 1990)

"I bring my whole history, my tradition, my experience, my culture, my African-American song and dance and gesture and movement and teaching, and preaching and healing and responsibility as a gift to the Church." USCCB speaker 1989

Sister Thea Bowman, the granddaughter of slaves, was born on December 29, 1937, in Yazoo City, Mississippi. Her parents named her Bertha and raised her in the Methodist faith until at the age of nine when she was so impressed by the "olde folks" that she asked if she could become Catholic. She later went to college and then became the first African-American to join the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration in Wisconsin. Sister Thea shared the message of God's love through a teaching career. After 16 years of teaching at the elementary, secondary and college levels, Sister Thea Bowman was invited to

be a special consultant for the Catholic Church. She gave presentations around the country aimed at bridging racial and cultural divisions. Blessed with extraordinary talent, she became a poet, a preacher, a master teacher, a vocalist, an evangelist and an African-American catalyst. She combined her gifts of singing and gospel preaching, with prayers and storytelling. Sister Thea Bowman was diagnosed with bone cancer in 1984. Yet, she continued her fight against the evils that drive people apart, from her wheelchair, until her death at age 53 in 1990. Sister Thea Bowman said she prayed "to live until I die – to live fully." And that she did.

Sister Thea Bowman lived a Spirit-filled life! Let us pray:

Ever loving God, who by your infinite goodness inflamed the heart of your servant and religious, Sister Thea Bowman with an ardent love for you and the People of God; a love expressed through her indomitable spirit, deep and abiding faith, dedicated teaching, exuberant singing and unwavering witnessing of the joy of the Gospel.

Her prophetic witness continues to inspire us to share the Good News with those who we encounter; most especially the poor, oppressed and marginalized. May Sister Thea's life and legacy compel us to walk together, to pray together and to remain together as missionary disciples ushering in the new evangelization for the Church we love.

Gracious God imbue us with the grace and perseverance that you gave your servant, Sister Thea. For in turbulent times of racial injustice, she sought equity, peace and reconciliation. In times of intolerance and ignorance, she brought wisdom, awareness, unity and charity. In times of pain, sickness and suffering, she taught us how to live fully until called home to the land of promise. If it be your Will, O God, glorify our beloved Sister Thea, by granting the favor I now request through her intercession (mention your request), so that all may know of her goodness and holiness and may imitate her love for You and Your Church. We ask this through Your Son and our Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.
